L'Université de Moncton and Correctional Service Canada have signed a collaboration agreement that will provide a minimum of 10 internships for students in UdeM's criminology programs through the public service CO-OP program, the university announced Friday.

The agreement will be in effect for five years, until January of 2028. It applies to the criminology major and French immersion programs.

“This partnership enriches the academic experience of students in the Criminology program,” Dr. Denis Prud'homme, president and vice-chancellor of UdeM said in a news release. This is the university's fourth collaborative agreement with CSC.

The university said Correctional Service of Canada is looking at the possibility of offering the orientation course, normally intended for CSC parole officers prior to their hiring, to a target group of criminology students.

As part of this agreement, UdeM is committed, among other things, to exploring the possibility of conducting research at CSC on bilingualism and to providing two spaces, free of charge, for CSC employees who participate in its French immersion program.
